Secondary 2

Students were very enthusiastic about continuing their learning in Term 4. They began by developing their skills across the key learning areas of the curriculum. In English, students have continued working hard on their sight words, communication and their individual reading goals.

For PBL, we are working on *Be Safe*. The students are learning how to stay safe around the school and we use our PBL visuals to help the students identify what safe 'looks like'.

For mathematics, we are continuing our focus on money which was commenced last term. This strand of the curriculum is an important life skill for all students, we have been working on the value of money and how money is used to purchase goods.

Throughout the year, we have been conducting many of our subjects outdoors so that students are provided with an alternate

learning space, in addition to our classroom. We have covered a variety of subjects from the curriculum in our outdoor learning areas. For geography, we have been focusing on *sustainability* by gardening, in PE, students have been playing ball sports and for PDH, students have engaged with the topic of *bike safety*. Secondary 2 are thrilled to learn and explore beyond the classroom, as part of the Life Skills syllabus.

We are looking forward to some great learning experiences during our last term.

Primary 4

Welcome back everyone, we look forward to another fabulous term of teaching and learning! In English, students are exploring factual texts by reading non-fiction books. We began by learning about dogs. Students also enjoyed reading *Davy D.'s Dog* by Jill

Eggleton, which details how a big dog will not go outside. The students really enjoyed locating high frequency sight words, saying the word 'big' and repeating ryhming words such as 'lick and flick' and 'smash and crash'.

During mathematics, students are exploring money, data and chance. The students are supported when using pretend money to exchange for goods and services. They earnt five \$1.00 coins by being a safe, respectful learner and used the coins to pay for the trampoline, computer and to buy an icecream.





Visual arts this term will include a variety of 3D scultptures from different artists, sculptors and ceramists. The students took turns by following a simple procodure to create a magnificent scultpture by Jeff Koon titled *Play-Doh*. Archie was excited to show the sculpture to others, so we walked to different classrooms to showcase what he made with his peers and asked the teachers and students to add more playdoh to the top of the artwork.

During history, the students are learning about one of Australia's most famous landmarks - the Sydney Harbour Bridge. They took turns in designing their own bridge to link Northern Sydney to the city. Students then replicated the Sydney Harbour Bridge by drawing their own interpretations of it. They then role-played as engineers by constructing a bridge to enable the cars and trains to cross over the water.

This will assist students in consolidating their understanding of our PDH unit of work; *Playing Together*. It will provide students with the opportunity to demonstrate everything we have learnt at school! Students will be encouraged to take turns using the equipment, venturing up the stairs and sliding down the slide.

Primary 2

Hello from P2! We began this term by introducing the students to two new robots: Sphero and Makey Makey. The students have enjoyed learning to connect the iPads to the Sphero to make it move in different directions, change colours, make sounds and create a simple sequence.

The students were fascinated when utilising the Makey Makey robot, as they connected it to everyday items to then play musical instruments on the board. They thoroughly enjoyed tapping a banana or playdoh and listening to the different sounds and admiring the colours, while they played with the guitar, harp and piano.

The students have continued to enthusiastically explore coding with the BeeBots. They are learning to follow a single step visual sequence to make the BeeBot move up or down. Adjustments have been made for our students by creating a boundary using a box, bubble wrap and the finished symbol, so students can determine the direction the BeeBot will move. Also, we have engineered our environment by making another resource using a black box with yellow tape. This resource supports learning, as it caters for students that experience Cortical Vision Impairment (CVI).

Additionally, students have been participating in the unit *Playing Together* for PDHPE to engage in outdoor learning. The students are also learning to respond to the PBL expectations to learn to safely use the equipment, wait their turn and share with their peers.

Secondary 3

Term 4 is typically busy for students in our class, as there are a lot of preparations for transition to post-school options, and the graduation dinner. Secondary 3 have been discussing these 'celebrations' in our English unit of work, as well as considering celebrations such as Diwali and Halloween. The students have explored the origins of these celebrations, have focused on objects of significance and are currently developing invitations to the events.

Students have also considered how Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders dress for celebrations of their culture, and made representations of cultural dress.

We have been really engaged in our new science topic exploring how daily and seasonal changes affect the environment. Students have been identifying the weather and using our outdoor thermometer to record the temperature on the basketball court. We have enjoyed investigating the concepts of 'hot' and 'cold' through a variety of sensory experiences.

Everyone has been making wonderful gains in our literacy programs for reading and writing activities. This term we are focusing on non-fiction texts and everyone was very engaged in the big book *My Face* exploring facial features and identifying our own and others features.
