R/Principal's Message

It has been wonderful to reflect on student progress this semester as teachers finalise end of semester one reports. These will go home to parents/carers in the final week of Term. I would like to acknowledge our skilled and dedicated staff for their commitment to delivering quality teaching and learning programs enabling our students to engage and achieve. We are pleased to launch the new school artwork. This was designed by local indigenous artist, Michael Fardon. The artwork depicts the school as a place of knowledge and learning and provides a 'bird's eye view' of its location, showing Canada Bay and the mangroves. It details a journey/path working towards a better future and includes handprints representing Ancestors. An extract of this meaningful artwork now features on our new letterhead, as depicted on this newsletter.



I am pleased to announce that, provided all goes to plan, new playground equipment will be installed in our Magnolia Courtyard during the school holidays. This will provide students with engaging and interactive equipment that will allow them to enjoy this space and provide them with additional recreational activities.

Staff and parents/carers from Lucas Gardens School recently attended 'A Night in Positano,' a charity fundraiser organised by Community for Communities to celebrate their 20 years of fundraising. It was a lovely evening and an opportunity for us to thank them for their significant support of Lucas Gardens School over the years.

Term 2 has been a significant term for our Aboriginal Education Committee. As part of our commitment to acknowledge each of the key dates on the calendar for Aboriginal peoples, we marked National Sorry Day on 26 May, leading into National Reconciliation Week from 27 May to 3 June, and finally, Mabo Day also on 3 June. As Wendy mentioned, we were fortunate to launch our artwork on National Sorry Day and used National Reconciliation Week to run a series of activities in classrooms, centred around understanding and appreciating the different elements of the artwork. During the holidays, NAIDOC Week will be celebrated across the country from 3 – 10 July. As this falls in the holidays, we will be engaging in a range of activities throughout Week 10 of the Term to mark this important celebration. We are currently in the final stages of liaising with our Aboriginal artist to plan the creation of artworks by students during this week.

In music, students are exploring making their own songs using instruments and *Chrome Music Lab*. Students are learning about the musical concepts of rhythm, pitch and dynamics through various musical apps on *the* Commbox, as well as making simple musical pieces on *Song Maker*. We have also been investigating what sounds instruments make by playing a range of them.

Students in Primary 1 have been working hard this Term. For science, they have been learning about materials. Students have explored properties of natural and made materials and investigated which materials are useful for making everyday objects.

Primary 5

Primary 5 have been working very hard on all goals semester, includina their this personalised learning and support goals. All students have been working on their communication goals - including locating or touching familiar objects related to their timetable and becoming confident using words and key word signs. This Term, students enjoyed activities related to Sorry Day and Reconciliation Week. We made handprints to signify our contribution to 'Sorry' for Sorry Day. We also looked at our amazing new school Aboriginal artwork, and made a collage based on it to represent parts of our local area.

In mathematics, we have been learning about addition and subtraction. We have been thinking about the concept of adding 'more' or 'taking away' objects and counting how many 'altogether.' We have been exploring some traditional Aboriginal games, which involved counting and adding or taking away. Ngaka is an Aboriginal game similar to Tic Tac Toe - we have been learning to count and make three in a row by adding painted stones to a grid.

In science this Term, we have been having fun with materials - either mixing them or adding heat or cooling them to see how they change. Everyone loved watching and listening to the popcorn as it changed with heat. It's been a great Term and everyone has worked really hard. We wish everyone a relaxing holiday.

We also engage and play with different instruments, such as the drums, shakers and guitar. This also presents as the perfect opportunity for students to practise communication goals by using their device to make a comment or make a request.

Secondary 4

Students have been working hard on their goals this Term! All students have demonstrated great progress towards their PLSP goals, as well as their goals in literacy and numeracy.



In mathematics this Term, students have been focusing on developing their understanding of pattern and been learning to continue or repeat a pattern, using colour or shape, with blocks and beads.

In science, students have been exploring the topic, "Chemical Changes." They began by investigating a range of materials to test a variety of chemical changes and learn that when a chemical change occurs, new substances are formed. They explored this cooking through chemistry and art experiments where they created a melted crayon artwork to examine what happened when they applied heat to crayons. Students also in engaged in chemistry cooking including baking a cake and making popcorn to deepen their understanding of the 'Material World.'

In Hydro, students continue to increase their familiarity with water and work hard on developing their swimming skills.
